

## Publications of Interest

### Joint publication with CAI-Asia on Sustainable Urban Freight in Asia online



Freight transport has severe negative impacts on the local air quality in many Asian cities, and contributes significantly to greenhouse gas emissions. To avoid such undesired effects and at the same time to foster economic development by assuring an efficient supply of urban agglomerations with the wide range of required goods, local and national governments in Asia need to take action now. The joint GIZ - CAI Asia publication Sustainable Urban Freight in Asia provides an overview on the current situation with regard to urban freight in Asia and outlines possible measures to be taken. It is based in part on SUTP's Module 1g Urban Freight in Developing Cities.

## Better mobility in cities - Stuttgart launched EU Project "2MOVE2"




The European mobility project "2MOVE2" was launched in the German city of Stuttgart. Stuttgart and three other cities will develop together practical steps to improve urban mobility. Stuttgart itself is mainly focused on low emission traffic control, electro mobility and mobility management. Also new concepts of freight traffic will be developed and implemented in the next four years. The project has a volume of 9.1 million euros, making it one

of the largest funded projects, the city of Stuttgart has ever conducted. The project started with a two-day meeting in the end of January. The political opening of "2MOVE2" will take place this summer in Stuttgart.


## Guidelines on Developing and Implementing a Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan

## Indonesia submits sustainable transport NAMA



Indonesia has submitted the "Sustainable Urban Transport Initiative" as a Nationally Appropriate Mitigation Action (NAMA), seeking support for implementation. The initiative seeks to foster sustainable urban transport in Indonesian cities through the adoption of measures to stop the increasing motorization in the country and diminish existing externalities of transportation.

During the pilot phase, the programme, which is under development, will focus on implementing low-carbon mobility plans in the cities of Medan, Menado and Batam. In this phase, activities to be carried out at the national level include: the development of a policy framework for sustainable, low-carbon urban transport; capacity building; the development of guidelines for local planning; and the monitoring, reporting and verification (MRV) of measures implemented.

With its several dozen kilometers of segregated cycling infrastructure Batumi, a Georgian city on the Black Sea coast, seems to be cyclists' paradise of the Caucasus: very visible bike tracks along the coast and throughout the city center,

bike-sharing stations installed in multiple locations. It is a compact city with cycling-friendly landscape and climate. The city of Batumi started to invest in cycling infrastructure together with other grand projects to make this location an attractive and comfortable summer resort.

## World Bank president and Mayor of New York discuss challenges in Urban Transportation



On January 18th, World Bank President Jim Yong Kim and New York City Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg engaged in a live streamed conversation about shaping the future of urban transportation. The event was hosted by the World Bank and EMBARQ and the session was part of the 10th annual Transforming Transportation conference. The two leaders discussed the current trends in urban transport, as well as the challenges that cities facing with respect to governance and

financing of urban transport projects. Both leaders noted that sustainable transport goes beyond moving vehicles and infrastructure, and furthermore agreed that any choices city leaders make today, particularly in transportation, will lock them into urban development patterns for decades to come.

The discussion was moderated by Zanny Minton Beddoes, an editor at The Economist, and closed by WRI's president, Dr. Andrew Steer. Senior decision makers and transport experts from around the world attended the event that was also broadcasted on live stream.
